## Riverside Primary School Statement for Sports Premium 2024-2025

## What is the Sports Premium?

The government is providing funding of £150 million each year for academic years 2013-2020 to provide new and substantial primary school sport funding. The funding is jointly provided by the Department for Education, Health and Culture and Media and Sport. It will see money going directly to primary school headteachers to spend on improving the quality of sport and PE; each school will receive £16,000 plus an extra £10 per pupil in year 1-6. Here at Riverside Primary that will mean £18900 for 2024-2025

## Purpose of the funding

The government funding is ring fenced only to be spent on PE and School Sport. The outcome is to improve teaching and learning in PE and School Sport. Ofsted have strengthened its coverage of sport within the inspectors' handbook and supporting guidance, so that schools and inspectors are clear about how PE and school sport will be assessed in the future as part of the overall provision offered by the school. The revised handbook will ask inspectors to consider: "How well the school uses its Sports Premium Funding to improve the quality and breadth of its PE and sporting provision, including increasing participation in PE and school sport, so that all pupils develop healthy lifestyles and reach the performance levels they are capable of."

## How is it spent?

The aim of the funding is to improve the quality and a breadth of our PE and school sport provision and to meet the criteria we have identified a number of key priorities which include:

- Investing in continued professional development for our staff.
- Increasing the competitive opportunities available to all of our children.
- Increasing the number of after school sports clubs available to our children.
- PE subject leader to visit other classes and give demonstration lessons.
- Time for PE subject leader to meet and audit needs/results of input.
- Working in partnership with other schools to share expertise and resources.
- Working in partnership with other organisations/agencies to increase the number of opportunities available to the children and staff.
- Offering new and varied sporting opportunities and experiences for our children and staff.

## How will we know it's working?

We will carry out regular reviews on progress and audit and assess our needs. Individual pupils or groups of children who may be targeted for intervention will be assessed at the start of the programme and reviewed as the year progresses. Teaching staff have all been audited, prior to the start of this academic year, in relation to their training needs. At the end of the year a review of those needs and how they have been addressed will be undertaken. At the same time, an audit for future needs will be carried out.

#### Review of 2023-2024 - IMPACT ON SCHOOL SPORT

In 2023-2024 Riverside Primary School were able to further lift the profile of School Sport using the funding provided through the School Sports Premium.

#### The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity:

The school has introduced a variety of after-school clubs, including football, badminton, hockey and dance which has led to an increase in the number of pupils participating in regular physical activity outside of school. There has also been a notable rise in participation from less active pupils due to the variety of sports and fitness activities that have been offered. New sports equipment such as portable goals and basketball hoops that have been purchased has increased the level of engagement within sports in the playground. This has improved the confidence and enthusiasm for sports and activity among pupils across the school and there has been a positive shift in attitudes towards physical activity.

#### The profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole-school improvement:

Physical education is now central to the school's identity, with regular assemblies celebrating sporting achievements, participations, and values such as resilience and perseverance. This focus has fostered a culture of pride and inclusion, with pupils, staff and parents recognising the value of physical activity in personal and academic growth.

## Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport:

School Sports Premium funding has been used to upskill staff through professional development in delivering high-quality PE lessons. This has improved consistency and raised the standard of teaching, ensuring that PE is as rigorous and impactful as the core subjects.

#### Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils:

School Sports funding has been used to provide pupils with the opportunity to visit a scout campsite which has enabled pupils to engage in non-traditional sports such as archery, orienteering and outdoor activities. These activities exposes pupils to new challenges, encouraging them to explore beyond mainstream activities such as football and basketball.

### Increased participation in competitive sport:

The number of pupils participating in competitive sport has increased significantly, with many trying competitions for the first time. Through this, pupils have developed skills such as discipline, resilience and being able to work collaboratively through their involvement in team and individual events. The opportunity to represent the school in competitions has fostered a strong sense of pride and unity among pupils, staff, and parents which has been very evident in the Year 4 and 5 boys football league.
